NIPISSING-PARRY SOUND CATHOLIC DSB BLESSES NEW ADMINISTRATION OFFICE

Nipissing-Parry Sound Catholic District School Board staff, trustees and community partners joined together on October 7 for the Official Blessing and Open House of the new NPSC administration office.

Occupying three levels in the historic Scollard Hall building, the office was redesigned to create an effective office environment while preserving aspects of the site's rich history.

The building was officially blessed by Board Chaplain Monsignor Norm Clement.

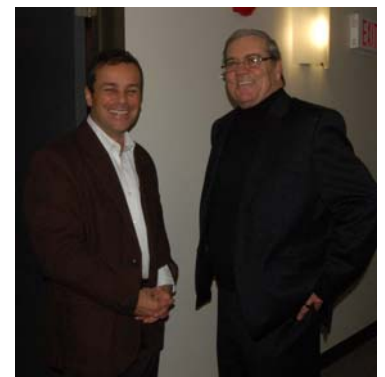
The event continued with an opening prayer in the neighbouring St. Lawrence Chapel (a part of St. Joseph-Scollard Hall Catholic Secondary School) where guests also enjoyed music by the SJSH Grade 11 & 12 Instrumental Class and heard greetings from Board Chair Jacques Bégin, Director of Education Anna Marie Bitonti, Mayor Vic Fedeli and Architect Jean Larocque.

Guests witnessed the official ribbon cutting in the main lobby and were given the opportunity to browse the facility.

The move to this building allows the Board to house all operational and educational services under one roof and to make use of what was surplus capacity at the site.

Most importantly, said Anna Marie Bitonti, is operating the administrative office in such close proximity to its secondary school and students.

"It keeps us in touch with what we are all about and serves as a constant reminder to central office staff of the importance of our work in support of the success of all our students."

"Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me." Mark 9:37

The disciples had been walking with Jesus. They were discussing their relationship with him. They were sharing the importance they would have because of him.

Jesus must have walked ahead of them or behind them while they were talking. Jesus was doing his own thinking, he was feeling his own sentiments. He was in his

world. They were in theirs.

Jesus spoke about being betrayed into human hands. They spoke about how others would be delivered to them. He spoke about saving others, carrying their burdens. They spoke about themselves in the small circles of their personal lives. Jesus spoke about being a servant. They spoke about being a master.

At first sight, of course, their conversation seemed to be very pious. They spoke about their relationship with him. They spoke about their relationship with God. Peter spoke about the trust Jesus had in him. John spoke about the love Jesus had for him. Judas spoke about the purse of money he kept for Jesus. Philip spoke about the appreciation Jesus had for his judgement and flair.

They were, in fact, all speaking about themselves. They were not speaking, they were arguing, they were fighting, they were quarreling. There was no love, there was tension, there was no sharing, there was animosity.

Jesus must have walked ahead of them or behind them during that conversation. He could not have walked with them at that time.

Later when Jesus was with them in the house, he asked them what they were arguing about on the way. There was a long pause, there was an uncomfortable silence, there was no answer. They looked at one another. They felt ashamed. They were arguing about who was the greatest. Jesus called them together and told them that whoever wanted to be first had to be last of all and servant of all.

Then Jesus took a child in his arms and told them that when they would welcome one such child in his name they would be welcoming him and by welcoming him they would welcome God who sent him. We do not know what they did, but if they received that child in all sincerity that night, they must have been filled – according to the word of Jesus – with God.

Being filled with God, the question, 'Who is the greatest?' did not make sense anymore.

If they did not get the message that night we know they eventually did get the message because they became followers of the Servant and became servants themselves.

As followers of the Servant and servants with Christ, guided by the Holy Spirit, let us see God in all our students and one another.
